# American Crow (LARGE)

- Length: 17 in.
- Bill is small, straight, and sharp
- Entirely black plumage



## Brewer's Blackbird

- Length: 8 in.
- Sharp black bill
- Male: entirely black, vellow eyes
- Female: dark gray, dark eyes



# House Finch

- · Length: 5.25 in.
- Conical bill
- Males have red breast, rump and forehead
- Brown wings and tail
- Streaked belly

Western Scrub Jay

Blue head and body

Length: 11 in.

Gray belly



### House Sparrow

- Length: 4.25 in.
- Brown throat
- Gray crown and body
- Brown, streaked wings
- White patch on wing
- Thick conical bill
- Pink legs and feet



### American Robin

- Length: 8.5 in.
- · Red breast and belly
- Back is graybrown, with darker head and tail



# Rock Dove (Pigeon)

- Length: 12.5 in.
- Small round head
- Plumage may have a variety of colors



# Fox Squirrel

- Body: 13 in. Tail: 11 in.
- Common in urban parks
- Fur on tail and hind feet reddish-orange
- Back is brown to gravish
- Cream to orange belly



# Western Gray Squirrel

- Body: 12 in. Tail: 12 in.
- Large squirrel
- Found in woodlands
- Back is silver gray
- White belly
- No rust color in fur



# Eastern Gray Squirrel

- Body: 10 in. Tail: 10 in
- Found in urban parks
- Similar to Western Gray Squirrel but yellow or rusty color on back
- White belly
- Sometimes all black in color




