


PARK NEEDS ASSESSMENT FINDINGS

PARKS & OPEN SPACE INVENTORY

Four types of parks and open spaces were identified as means to categorize the facilities inventoried during the Parks Needs Assessment. This uniform categorization system ensured an "apples to apples" comparison among facilities and Study Areas. The four categories are specific to the Parks Needs Assessment, and differ from the categories used in cities and by other agencies in the County. For the inventory, specialized facilities serving the entire County or specific sub-regions, such as arboreta, amphitheaters, and wilderness parks were included in the category that covered their specific characteristics, and only if they were part of a park or open space area.

- LOCAL PARKS** are under 100 acres and contain active amenities such as athletic courts and fields, playgrounds, and swimming pools. Local parks identified in the inventory are sometimes called community parks or regional parks by the agencies that operate them. These parks are included in the analysis of all park metrics. **1,882 INVENTORIED**
- REGIONAL RECREATION PARKS** are over 100 acres and contain active amenities such as athletic courts and fields, playgrounds, and swimming pools. Locally administered "regional parks" under 100 acres in size are not included in this category, and are included as local parks in the inventory instead. Regional Recreation Parks are included in the analysis of all park metrics, and were subject to a separate facility review process due to their large size and regional importance. **17 INVENTORIED**
- REGIONAL OPEN SPACE** includes facilities that are more than 5 acres and generally contain only passive amenities such as visitor centers, trails, picnic shelters, or restrooms. These facilities are not included in the analysis of any individual park metric, but are included in the analysis of park need. **209 INVENTORIED**
- NATURAL AREAS** are generally larger than 100 acres and contain no reported amenities. These facilities are not included in any of the needs analyses of the Parks Needs Assessment. **1,815 INVENTORIED**





PARK NEEDS ASSESSMENT FINDING

PARK METRICS

Park need is traditionally measured with a single metric, such as the number of acres of park land available to residents, or the percentage of residents living within walking distance of a park. Measuring only a single aspect of need provides a one-dimensional understanding of park need. The Steering Committee recognized that park need is affected by many variables and approved a suite of five metrics that produce a robust understanding of physical park needs in each Study Area and in the County.

Schools Out for Summer



The Summer Nutrition Programs are designed to replace school breakfast and lunch, providing meals at sites that offer educational, enrichment, physical and recreational activities, keep children safe and out of trouble, and provide crucial child care for working parents.

Pasadena Unified SD has developed a model of community partnerships that provide summer meals at community sites where the students are each day.

Summer Program Basics- Who Can Sponsor?

- ▶ USDA-Food & Nutrition Services Division
 - ▶ CA Dept. of Education-Nutrition Services
 - ▶ Local Sponsor / Non Profit or School
 - ▶ Public or private nonprofit schools
 - ▶ Units of local, municipal, county, tribal, or State Government
 - ▶ Private nonprofit organizations
 - ▶ Public or private nonprofit camps
 - ▶ Public or private nonprofit universities or colleges



Summer Program Basics- Where can the be located?

- ▶ Meal Sites may be located in a variety of settings, including:
 - ▶ Schools, rec centers, playgrounds, parks, churches, community centers, day-camps, residential summer camps, housing projects, and migrant centers, or on Indian reservations
- ▶ Site Types: Open, Enrolled, Camp, Migrant, NYSP
- ▶ Sites with activities are the most successful



Who Can Eat?

- ▶ Youth and children 18 years and younger may receive a free meal
- ▶ A sponsor "may" offer two meals per day
 - ▶ Breakfast / Lunch; Lunch/Snack; Breakfast/Snack
 - ▶ Many sites offer only one meals per day
- ▶ Some sites offer meals to parents
 - ▶ Must charge parents or secure alternate funding



How Do I Get Started?

- ▶ Sponsor has own kitchen, team, & service site
 - ▶ Apply Directly to State of CA
- ▶ Sponsor has programs and site, no kitchen
 - ▶ Seek out partner to prep and deliver meals
 - ▶ Vended meals model
 - ▶ You are still sponsor
 - ▶ Seek out partner to act as sponsor
 - ▶ Partner handles all admin and food production
