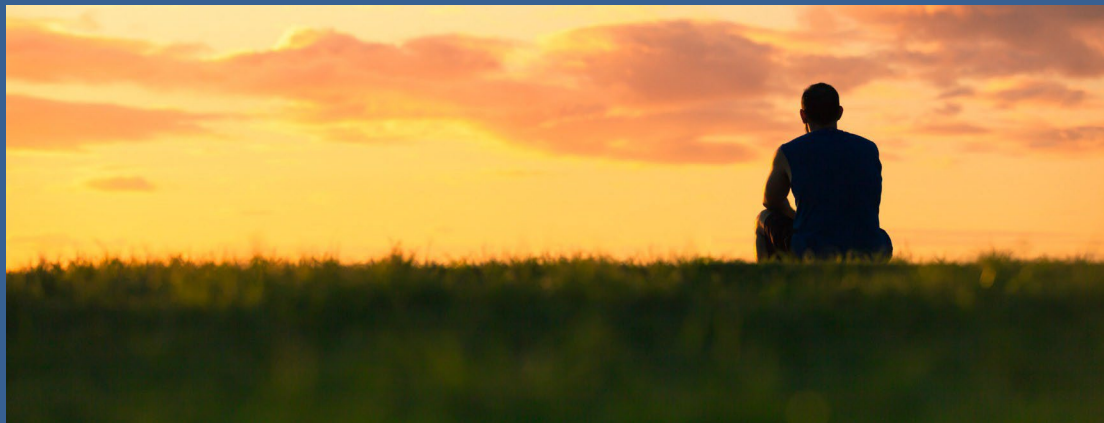

## OPIOID OVERDOSE IS ON THE RISE

Opioid use is becoming more and more common. Overdoses occur when someone takes too much of an opioid (heroin, oxycontin, morphine) and begins to stop breathing. Naloxone will quickly reverse the overdose by counteracting the opioid.

## Does your loved one suffer from opioid addiction?

Having Naloxone available can be a matter of life and death. Ambulances may not arrive in time to assist and the overdose may become fatal.
