#### Description:

Human trafficking and domestic and sexual violence victims/survivors are experiencing increased isolation and danger as a result of social distancing measures during the COVID-19 public health emergency. The COVID-19 public health emergency has illuminated both urgent and ongoing health care needs for survivors, as well as economic and employment impact. This webinar will discuss the ways in which advocacy programs and collaborative partners are shifting their in-person and virtual approaches to meet the needs of trafficking survivors. The webinar will also identify tools and approaches for anti-human trafficking collaborations or task forces

to expand their partnerships with health care and workforce development partners, to enhance safety and wellness for survivors.
