Vision for a Violence Free LA County

OVP strengthens collaboration, capacity and partnerships to prevent multiple forms of violence and promote healing across communities in LA County.

Established by the Board of Supervisors in February 2019 in the Department of Public Health.

Governance Structure: County Leadership Committee & Community Partnership Council guide the work of the office and implementation of the strategic plan.



OVP Early Implementation Priorities





Gun Violence Prevention Platform (GVPP)

- OVP launched the GVPP in June 2022 following horrific deaths in Buffalo, New York and Uvalde, Texas, in addition to increased gun deaths and injuries in LA County including the Monterey Park mass shooting in January 2023.
- To develop a plan of action OVP established a Gun Violence Prevention Taskforce, comprised of over 30 community and county partners.
- The Taskforce identified 4 key action areas from a list of 40 strategies to prioritize in 2023 to reduce gun violence.



Gun Violence Prevention Platform (GVPP)

- 1. Advocate for robust gun safety legislation locally and nationally, including the federal ban on assault weapons and large capacity magazines.
- 2. Promote social connections, healing, and a culture of peace through safe spaces and programs that address harm, trauma, and the impact of violence. Support opportunities that foster community togetherness, inclusion, and a sense of belonging while embracing diversity.
- 3. In partnership with the courts, community and faith-based organizations, and law enforcement, improve awareness and access to Gun Violence Restraining Orders (GVROs.) Ensure services, systems and messaging are accessible, culturally relevant and cause no harm.
- 4. Increase access to comprehensive, culturally relevant physical and mental health supports and services for all students, K-12. Enhance school safety by implementing pilot initiatives in at least 3 school districts.



OVP Program Activities

- Creating GVP materials including flyers, talking points, pledge cards, posters, buttons, stickers, etc.
- Defining a role for OVP contractors and DPH staff.
- Mobilizing students and providers for fall campus teach-in focused on gun safety advocacy and prevention efforts.
- Engaging students and youth by working with Wellbeing Centers, Dream Centers, and DPH Youth Advisory Council.
- Investing American Rescue Plan Act funds to support youth.
- Coordinating Mental Health First Aid trainings.
- Training health care providers to screen for gun safety.
- Implementing GVRO trainings.
- Distributing gun safe storage handbooks and locks.
- Conducting trauma informed healing events in each SPA.

The Office for Victims of Crime defines trauma informed, in part, as approaches delivered with an understanding of the vulnerabilities and experiences of trauma survivors, including the prevalence and physical, social, and emotional impact of trauma. Trauma-informed approaches place priority on restoring the survivor's feelings of safety, choice, and control.*
