Mandatory Disease Reporting

• *CCR, Title 17,* Sec. 2500 & 2505, mandates the reporting of over 85 diseases/conditions to public health

• ACDC serves as lead for surveillance & investigation of communicable disease cases and outbreaks *(other than TB, STDs, and HIV/AIDS)*

Title 17, California Code of Regulations (CCR), § 2500

It is the duty of every health care provider, knowing of or in attendance on a case or suspected case of any diseases or conditions listed below, to report to the local health officer for the jurisdiction where the patient resides. "Health care provider" encompasses physicians (surgeons, osteopaths, oriental medicine practitioners), veterinarians, podiatrists, physician assistants, registered nurses (nurse practitioners, nurse midwives, school nurses), infection control professionals, medical examiners/coroners, dentists, and chiropractors, as well as any other person with knowledge of a case or suspected case.

Urgency Reporting Requirements

🖀 = Report immediately by telephone 🛛 = Report within 1 working day of identification 🛛 🗢 = Report within 7 calendar days from time of identification

Smallpox

- Incubation:
 - 12-14 days (range 7-17 days)
- Acute onset flu-like symptoms:
 - Malaise, fevers, rigors, vomiting, headache, backache
- Rash: 2-3 days later





Smallpox

- Transmission: Person-to-person
 - Droplet
 - Contact
 - Respiratory secretions
 - Aerosol release



Highly communicable during the presence of skin rash

What isolation precautions should be taken when a smallpox case is suspected?





ANSWER

Suspect cases should be **immediately** placed into airborne and contact isolation precautions

What is the time frame for reporting a suspected smallpox case to Public Health?





ANSWER

IMMEDIATELY!

- Smallpox is a highly contagious disease
- Considered a potential Bioterrorist Agent
