# New Ethical Dilemmas in the Digital Age and Technology-Based Clinical Supervision: What Providers Need to Know

## Training Overview

The use of technology (e.g., e-mail, cell phones, tablets, etc.) by behavioral health professionals is increasing, and presents unique ethical dilemmas. Some professionals are ethically astute but struggle to keep up with technology; others are comfortable with technology but less familiar with ethical codes. In fact in some cases, technology use has become so ubiquitous that clinicians may forget about privacy, security, and confidentiality issues that put them at risk for ethical violations. The goal of the **morning session** is to provide an overview of technology and ethics, the use of social networking websites by clinical supervisors, counselors, and clients, issues with emailing clients, conducting internet searches on clients and/or supervisees, and performing client consultations online. This session will also address counselor self-disclosure and self-disclosures in the age of the Internet, privacy and security issues, and ethical reasoning. The goal of the **afternoon session** is to familiarize Clinical Supervisors with the use of technology-based clinical supervision (TBCS) resources and guidelines to extend the reach of clinical supervision in mental health and SUD settings where supervision resources are strained, particularly remote or rural settings. This session is designed specifically for experienced Clinical Supervisors in the substance use disorder treatment field and as such, does not cover the basics of how to be a Clinical Supervisor. Participants will have the opportunity to observe and practice delivery of clinical supervision services using different types of technology.

**By the end of the daylong training, participants will be able to:**

1. List at least three technology- and social media-related ethical concerns facing behavioral health clinicians.
2. Discuss two methods to address clinician self-disclosure in the age of the Internet.
3. Identify three barriers to accessing quality clinical supervision.
4. Describe three benefits to using technology to extend the reach of clinical supervision.
5. Demonstrate, through role play, the effective use of at least one type of technology for clinical supervision.
