2006 Epidemiology Fact Sheet Foreign-Born Tuberculosis Cases

- In 2006, 7,799 foreign-born TB cases were reported in the United States, representing 56.6% of the total 13,779 TB cases in the nation. There has been a steady increase in the percentage of foreign-born TB cases in the United States since 1993 (7,403 cases, 29.0%). TB case rates among the foreign-born are also consistently higher than rates in US-born persons. In 2006, the foreign-born TB case rate was 22.0 cases per 100,000 population compared to 2.3 cases per 100,000 population for US-born TB cases.¹
- 2. In 2006, 2,136 foreign-born TB cases were reported in California, representing 76.9% of the total 2,779 TB cases in the state.²
- 3. In the year 2006, there were 885 cases of TB reported in Los Angeles County. Of the total 885 cases, 690 (78%) were foreign-born. The foreign-born TB cases were reported from 47 different countries and areas.³ Of the 690 foreign-born TB cases, 234 (33.9%) were from Mexico, 129 (18.7%) from the Philippines, 43 (6.2%) from China, 37 (5.4%) from Vietnam, 35 (5.1%) from Guatemala, and 26 (3.8%) from the Republic of Korea.
- 4. Of the 690 foreign-born TB cases, 410 (59.4%) were male and 280 (40.6%) were female.
- 5. Of the 690 foreign-born TB cases, the majority of cases occurred in the 15-34 year age group with 171 cases (24.8%), followed by the 65 years and older age group (165 cases, 23.9%), the 45-54 age group (120 cases, 17.4%), the 35-44 and the 55-64 age group (111 cases, 16.1 % for each group). Among Black and Hispanic foreign-born TB cases, the highest percentages were in the 15-34 year age group (47.6% and 29.5%, respectively). For Whites and Asians, the highest percentages were in the 65 years and older age group (59.4% and 31.7%, respectively).
- 6. The racial and ethnic background of the foreign-born TB cases was 322 (46.7%) Hispanic, 315 (45.7%) Asian, 32 (4.6%) White, and 21 (3%) Black.
- 7. In 2006, of the 690 foreign-born TB cases, 44 (6.4 %) were co-infected with HIV. Of these 44, thirty-four (77.3%) cases were Hispanic, 6 (13.6%) were Asian, and 4 (9.1%) were Black.
- 8. In 2006, 20 (2.9 %) foreign-born TB cases were homeless. Most (16 cases, 80%) were Hispanic.
- 9. Five hundred twenty-eight (76.5%) cases were diagnosed as pulmonary TB, and 162 (23.5%) cases as extra-pulmonary TB only.
